PASS: Chapters

Chapters

- Chapters exist to handle the internal functions of PASS.
- They are separate from the Representative structure.
- Chapters are either a "1" ATO only, a "2" AVS only, or a "3" combined. Most chapters now are 3's.
- Chapters are provided a budget based on their membership controlled at the local level.

Chapter Requirements

- Chapters must have a President, Vice President, and three Committee Chairs (Organizing, Legislative, Safety) to remain active.
- Chapters must have four meetings per year one a quarter to remain active.
- Once a chapter becomes inactive, the budget reverts back to the National Office and we run elections for new officers.

What do chapters do?

Four Primary Areas

Legislative

Organizing

Safety

Community Relations



Legislative Examples

Meeting with local officials on issues impacting the unit.

Setting up facility visits with lawmakers.

Raising PAC funds.

Organizing Examples

Recruiting and retaining new and existing members.

Holding regularly scheduled meetings at different locations.

Providing updates from the national and regional levels.

Safety Examples

Working with PASS Area Safety Representatives to identify potential safety issues.

Working with the same Representatives to help educate the workforce on safety issues.

Community Relations

Working with local non profits and charity organizations to provide assistance.

Providing support and solidarity to other unions such as walking picket lines, etc.

Participating in the local AFL-CIO

Final thoughts on Chapters

- Again, they are SEPARATE from the LR process.
- They have a local budget make sure they use it!
